# **OUTSTANDING ATAR RESULTS**

Hale School is extremely proud of the 2020 graduates for their hard work and commitment to their studies, reflected in their outstanding achievements. Congratulations to all students on achieving the WACE.

Of the 194 Year 12 students at Hale in 2020, 100% achieved the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE). 169 or 87.1% received an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR), 23 students were involved in the CareerLink programme and 2 on a General pathway.

In 2020 the median ATAR for Hale was 90.35 and 81.65 for WA.

**88** or **52%** of our ATAR students are in the top 10% of the nation with an ATAR of 90 or above.

12 or 7% of our ATAR students are in the top 1% of the nation with an ATAR of 99 or above.

## VOCATIONAL EDUCATION TRAINING (VET) 2020

AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING.



Blair Fowler completed a Certificate II in Plumbing and received the award for Excellence in Vocational The School is very proud of the achievements of the 23 students who undertook the CareerLink programme rather than an ATAR pathway. All 23 students received the WA Certificate of Education.

Fifteen students completed the Certificate IV in Business, which, combined with completion of the WACE, allows students alternate pathway entry to a variety of university courses. Two students completed a Certificate II in Data and Voice, one student completed a Certificate II in Construction and one student completed a Certificate II in Plumbing.

All CareerLink students undertook work placements linked to their planned future training and work vocations

Congratulations to the Year 12 cohort of 2020 on their 100% WACE graduation and their excellent individual results.

In a challenging year, our 194 Year 12 students maintained a steady focus on doing their best academically while maintaining a commitment to service learning, sport and a wide range of other co-curricular activities.

175 students achieved an ATAR and the high median of 90.35 is a testament to the dedication and determination of students and teachers. A majority of students actually gained a higher ATAR than the School's prediction – a good indicator that students were very well prepared for their final examinations.

Our 23 CareerLink students achieved a variety of nationally-accredited certificates and, notably, 15 completed Certificate IV in Business – an impressive achievement over three terms in Year 12.

In 2020, many students received early offers of university places well before their Year 12

studies were over. While this has an obvious appeal to students, it masks a risk that many key educational attributes of Year 12 will be jeopardised. These attributes include the need to work consistently year-long, to strive to do your best, to prepare right to the last moment for sometimes challenging external examinations, to value learning for its own sake, and to develop intrinsic motivation. These are all vitally important things for university success and success in any post-school education or training. It should be a particular point of pride for the Year 12 students of 2020 that their results show that in spite of early offers and even unconditional offers based on Year 11 results, our students worked with dedication and commitment right through to the ATAR examinations. They maintained that motivation to achieve their best for themselves and their classmates, for their parents and their school. By doing so, they gave themselves invaluable preparation for success and fulfilment in study and work beyond school.
