OUTSTANDING ATAR RESULTS

Hale School is extremely proud of the 2021 graduates for their hard work and commitment to their studies, reflected in their outstanding achievements. Congratulations to all students on achieving the WACE.

The total number of Hale students who completed an ATAR pathway in 2021 was 166. There were 34 students involved in the CareerLink or General Programme.







In 2021 the median ATAR for Hale was 91.85 and 81.75 for WA.

92 or 55% of our ATAR students are in the top 10% of the nation with an ATAR of 90 or above.

61 or 37% of our ATAR students are in the top 5% of the nation with an ATAR of 95 or above.

14 or 8% of our ATAR students are in the top 1% of the nation with an ATAR of 99 or above.

AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING.



Jack Fowler completed a Certificate IV in Business and received the award for Excellence in Vocational Education and Training.

The School is very proud of the achievements of the 34 students who undertook the CareerLink programme or General pathway.

A wide variety of Australian Qualifications Framework (AQF) certificates were completed by our students, ranging from the popular Certificate IV in Business to industry qualifications in areas such as Hospitality, Electrotechnology, Screen and Media, Plumbing and Education Support. Over 2000 workplace learning hours were accumulated by our CareerLink students, who benefitted from direct, relevant, on-the-job training in their chosen field.

Combined with completion of the WACE, these gualifications allow students alternate pathway entry to a variety of university courses or directly into employment.



The 2021 Year 12 students thoroughly deserve the outstanding results they have achieved this year. The committed approach to personal best from each student was a hallmark of this group.

At Hale School, students are given the best opportunity for success through the magnificent teaching of our staff, out-of-class revision programmes and many additional resources. All of this provides a great platform; however, it is the consistent effort and focus of individual students that really makes the difference.

I congratulate the class of 2021 on the excellent results they have achieved. From the ATAR cohort, the median ATAR of 91.85 was outstanding – amongst the highest in the country. From the CareerLink and General course cohort, to gain 30 Australian Qualifications Framework (AQF) Certificates including 20 Certificate IV in Business is also a formidable achievement.

Parents and other family members rightly share in the pride felt by our students because family support and understanding throughout the year is integral to individual success. Teachers also feel enormous pride in their students' results.

It is worth pausing for a moment to reflect on the incredible value of successful teacher-student relationships, which led to excellent outcomes this year, as in most years at Hale School. What characterises such successful relationships? The answer must include teacher expertise, mutual trust and respect, shared high standards, shared expectations that there will be hard work and a need for persistence and patience, confidence that the shared enterprise will be worthwhile. Enthusiasm and good humour are essential, and enjoyment needs to be there too. It sounds like a very tall order! Yet when I reflect on each of the subjects within the Year 12 cohort, I see excellent teacherstudent relationships that meet that definition, that develop quickly and then sustain good learning throughout the year. While the totality of a Hale School education is far more than can be measured by academic attainment, good learning sustained by excellent teacherstudent relationships lies at the heart of all that we do.

It is a 'new normal' now for many students to receive early offers for university during

Year 12, well before the ATAR examinations and in some instances based merely on Year 11 Semester 2 school reports! There has been almost no evidence that this has lessened motivation at Hale School. Boys have understood that while long-term success at university depends on many things, one significant element is the ability to know how to perform to your best in examinations. Our students showed the maturity and strength of character to prepare thoroughly for examinations after they had secured early offers. They set goals and worked hard to attain them over time. They worked individually and in groups in the library after school. They prepared and practised for challenging examinations. These are vital skills for tertiary success and for later life. Our students worked hard for themselves and for their classmates, knowing that the marks adjustment process is dependent on exam performance.

Finally, our Year 12 students largely got the balance right between study and sport, music, drama and service learning and all the other opportunities that a Hale School education offers.
